What is Phonics?

Phonics is the link between letters and the sounds that they make.

Using a highly structured programme, working through 6 progressive phases, children are taught to:

- Recognise the relationship between letters and their sounds.
- Identify the sounds that different combinations of letters make within words.
- Blend sounds together from left to right to make a word

Children can then use this knowledge to 'decode' new words that they see or hear. This is the first important step to learning to read and spell.



What is Phonics?

Phonics is knowledge of the alphabetic code

- 26 letters
- 44 sounds (phonemes)
- 140 different letter combinations (graphemes)

Using the alphabetic code, children can then develop their understanding of:

- Blending to read.
- Segmenting to spell.



Pure sounds

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It is important that we are modelling and using pure sounds all of the time instead of using the letter names to spell.

Example: pig should be sounded out by its pure letter sounds

not the letter names - pee-eye-gee

Some definitions...

Phoneme

The smallest unit of sound in a word.

Grapheme

What we write to represent a sound.



Some examples

s i t

peg



Some definitions...

Digraph

Two letters, which make one sound

A consonant digraph contains two consonants

sh ck th ll

A vowel digraph contains at least one vowel

ai ee ar oy



Some examples

Shed wait



More definitions...

Split digraph

Two letters which work together to make one sound, but are separated within the word. Example: make. These form the long vowel sounds.







Trigraph

Three letters which make one sound.

Example: ch air

l igh t



Sounds (phonemes) are represented by letters (graphemes).

A phoneme can be represented by one or more letters.

The same phoneme can be spelled or represented in more than one way. This is very common among the vowels.

Example: rain lake May straight acorn eight



The same spelling may represent more than one phoneme.

For example: 'ea'

head (/e/)

bead (/ee/)



- Phase 1: Exploring vocal sounds, instrumental sounds and rhyme (Ongoing Nursery/Reception)
- Phase 2: Introduce blending and segmenting of first 5 sets of sounds. (6 Weeks, Autumn term of reception)
- Phase 3: Taught a further 25 graphemes and continue to use blending and segmenting skills. (10 weeks, Spring term of reception)
- Phase 4: Revisit previous learning. (4 weeks, Summer term of reception revisited in Autumn 1, Year 1)
- Phase 5: Children begin to learn alternative pronunciations and spellings (30 weeks, Autumn 2, Spring, Summer of Year 1)



What is the Phonics Screening Check?


- All children in Year 1 and those children in Year 2 who did not pass, will sit the Phonics Screening Check.
- In previous years the pass mark has been 32 words out of 40.
- The 40 words are built up of 20 real words and 20 'nonsense'/'Beegu' words containing taught sounds.
- Children work 1:1 with their teacher to read each word aloud.



What happens during the check?

Your child will be shown 20 real words and 20 nonsense words (with aliens) on individual cards. Nonsense words are included because they will be new to all pupils, they do not favour children with good vocabulary knowledge

or visual memory of words.



What is allowed?

- Children can either 'sound talk' and blend the word or just say the word- we encourage them to segment and blend.
- Sound buttons
- Self-correction
- Taking into account any difficulties with pronunciation, accents or other needs.
- General and impartial encouragement. (okay, thank you and next)
- Children can have a break/s if they need to.



What is not allowed?

- -Saying the phonemes without blending.
- -Being encouraged to have another go.
- -Having several goes and then having the correct one accepted.



Issues that have arisen previously ...

- Some children read nonsense words wrongly as real words, e.g. strom as storm.
- Looped k k
- Unfamiliar with vocabulary used in real word sections of the check.
- Adjacent consonants e.g. nonsense words like **st<u>ra</u>ck** may be misread as **st<u>ar</u>ck**. This difficulty can be reduced through sounding out using fingers or sound buttons.



Sound Buttons

We therefore **encourage** children to use sound buttons when reading words. Regardless of whether the word is a real word or a nonsense word.



Reporting to parents

We will inform you of your child's result in the end of year report. We will also confirm if the child has met the standard threshold and therefore passed. Children who do not achieve the expected level are likely to be expected to retake the test at a later date.



How are the results used?

Results from the check will be used by schools to analyse their own performance and for Ofsted to use in inspections.
